Joining with many other denominations around our country, all gifts are distributed through the ministry of Church World Service (CWS). Based in Elkhart, Indiana, CWS provides disaster relief for victims overseas and here in the US. The funds we gather together and share become very real gifts of love, joy, and restoration: Families displaced by natural disaster or political unrest rejoice to receive food, shelter, and the comfort of a safe place to begin rebuilding their lives; the worried faces of mothers, whose children are threatened by food insecurity due to drought and famine, are transformed to deep peace when sustenance arrives; a woman who has had to walk miles for potable water for her family smiles as she draws water from a clean well near her home; children arrive excited for the first day of class at the village's new school.

5:15 pm – *#Occupy the Bible*, by Dr. Susan Thistlethwaite

"Jesus of Nazareth said and did a lot about money and power in his own time. Jesus occupied the Temple in Jerusalem – effectively the national bank of His time – and threw out those who were exploiting the poor. His followers included powerful 'women of means,' (such as Mary Magdalene, who was last at the cross, first at the tomb), who went on to become missionaries. Jesus taught 'in the streets,' preaching that God's 'side' is not that of the wealthy and powerful; and that all believers need to confront inequality now." **#Occupy the Bible** is an eye-opening, no-holds barred look at the real message of Jesus, using the scriptures that are foundational for the Christian faith. There will be more than 20 pieces ranging in price from \$15 to \$75 with all profits going toward another fine arts scholarship. From the Senior Pastor

Friends,

In Michigan, the church I once served was the proud sponsor of an active Boy Scout Troop. Dedicated adult leaders, one in particular, made deep impressions upon the lives of hundreds of boys coming of age. Dozens of those boys worked their way to the highest attainable rank, that of Eagle Scout.

The troop was active, well organized, committed to excellence. With church support, on church property, the troop constructed their own log cabin, which provided space for the Scoutmaster's office, troop meetings, and activities. It was named *Eagle's Nest*, an appropriate moniker, that recognized both past accomplishment and future hope.

The Boy Scout troop played a vital role in the life of my oldest son, Gabriel, who still fondly recalls Polar Bear overnights, with warm campfires to ward off the deep cold of winter. He participated in various camping expeditions: in nearby Metroparks, far off in the Michigan upper peninsula and Canada. There was also a troop trip to our nation's capital, which included an exhaustive hike of the storied battlefield at Gettysburg. Gabriel eventually attained the rank of Star Scout. His most memorable achievement, at least for me, was his "**totin chip**" card, personally signed by the scoutmaster, which was certification that he had received instruction in knife and ax handling, ensuring their proper use and safety. I thought that was just grand.

In my position as a cleric, I've worked with a few young scouts to attain their *God and Country Award*, which illustrates the scout's commitment to "**be reverent**." Given the religious diversity represented within scouts, there exists material appropriate for Protestant faith expression, as well as Catholic (Eastern and Roman), Eastern Orthodox, Mormon, Buddhist, Islamic, Jewish, Hindu or other religiously affiliated. Scouts have been quite adept at managing the reality of faith diversity within their ranks.

Regrettably, the same can't be said of accepting diversity of sexual orientation. In 1978, the BSA established a policy of not accepting gay scouts or gay scout leaders. Over the years, most recently this last summer, the policy has been reaffirmed. For congregations in the UCC who are committed to being inclusive, this has posed considerable consternation. It simply isn't fair and doesn't square with the best of scouting values that respect and uphold a broad spectrum of human difference. The policy denies gay youth the support and nurture of the scouting experience and prohibits youth leaders from sharing their skills. Simply put, the policy is an affront to those who find discrimination based upon sexual orientation to be repugnant (I've known at least one UCC Eagle Scout who surrendered his award in protest of the policy).

The UCC registered protest of the BSA policy of exclusion in 2003, calling for a lift of the ban, urging proclamation of welcome to gay youth and leaders, and reactivation of persons previously excluded due solely to the policy. More recently, early in 2013, BSA leadership announced the discriminating policy would be reconsidered, suggesting local determination of troop policy might be a more appropriate tactic. A vote scheduled for early February has subsequently been postponed until the BSA annual meeting in May.

This week I sent the following message to the BSA via its website:

I write in hope the BSA will reconsider current policy that excludes gay members and leaders. I look forward to the day when the church I serve might again sponsor a troop that welcomes all. Please be bold and proclaim a welcome that does not discriminate on the basis of sexual orientation.

Religious types, or others bound by rigid or phobic faith, will no doubt vigorously pressure BSA leaders to tow the line and thwart any change. It is hopeful, though, that a window exists for revision of the policy. Churches such as Plymouth are uniquely poised to advocate for such change. I invite you to join me in urging the BSA to amend their policy. All boys, regardless of orientation, should have the opportunity to "**be prepared**" for life, to learn of honor, and to do their best, in meeting the formidable challenges life presents.

Journey of Hope ... From Violence to Healing is an organization led by murder-victims' family members, originally founded in 1993 by SueZann Bosler, Marietta Jaeger-Lane, Sam Reese Sheppard, George White, and Bill Pelke.

These speakers share their stories about the process of healing through reconciliation. They call for alternatives to the death penalty and an end to the cycle of violence that capital punishment perpetuates in our society.

The organization promotes restorative justice, a new vision for the criminal justice system. It stresses the need for offender accountability and the opportunity for the offender to make things right with the victims of their crime, as much as possible. Restorative justice processes allow for greater healing in the lives of both victims and offenders, and peace in communities after crimes are committed.

Journey of Hope ... From Violence to Healing not only advocates for the abolition of the death penalty but offers a broad, universal message that addresses all forms of violence worldwide. It is their goal to federate and unite with international organizations and activists to raise awareness on a larger scale, to develop the appropriate tools to educate, and to support those who walk the same path.

All New Items

- One hand towel measuring approximately 16" x 28" (no fingertip or bath towels)
- One washcloth
- One wide-tooth comb
- One nail clipper
- One bar of soap (bath size in wrapper)
- One toothbrush (in original packaging)
- Six standard size Band-Aids®



Place all items in a one-gallon plastic bag with a zipper closure, remove excess air from bag, and seal. Please do not add toothpaste to the Hygiene Kit. Cartons of toothpaste that have an extended expiration date will be added to Hygiene Kits just prior to shipment. Hygiene Kit value: \$11.

Last year, Plymouth completed 97 Hygiene Kits and collected \$85.00 in donations.

It seems like yesterday that I was doing this very same thing, starting a term as the Moderator for Plymouth Church. This time I am following another wonderful leader in Plymouth's history, Eric Black. He served Plymouth well in his term as Moderator. I will try to follow his path and do the same for the next two years. Don't look for me to sing as he did. Eric is blessed with a beautiful musical voice and, sadly, I am not. I will try to communicate the happenings of the Executive Council and the Church, through these articles, and spare your ears.

For those of you in the congregation who may not know me well, let me give you some background: I have been a member of Plymouth for 27 years. Some of the areas I have been involved in over the years include the Board of Trustees, Christian Education Board, Deacons Standing Committee, Property Standing Committee, Memorial Gifts Committee, the Environmental Stewardship Committee, Foods Resource Bank Committee, and Interfaith Hospitality Network Coordinator. I have served as Assistant Moderator for three terms and a previous term as Moderator.

My family has been the recipient of the amazing support of Plymouth in times of sadness and in times of joy. I have been witness to many changes at Plymouth, both physical and spiritual, during the past 27 years, and I have welcomed many new members and friends to the congregation. I continue to learn new things about Plymouth all the time and cherish my experiences as a member of the congregation.

So now you know about me. How about a Plymouth update?

The Annual Business Meeting of the church took place **January 27**, following a wonderful Casa d'Plymouth fundraiser lunch cooked and served by the youth group. At this time, the annual report was received. Barbara Bugg requested that this document be reviewed and that any corrections or additions be sent to Lettie by **February 15**. The corrected annual report will be presented for approval to the Executive Council at the March meeting.

The 2013 budget was presented by Laura Coon. She expressed many thanks to John Escosa for leading an excellent stewardship campaign, which made the budget process an easy one. No board was asked to decrease their proposed budget for 2013, as has happened for the past several years. Laura Coon related that Plymouth received 38 new pledges and had 64 pledge units increase their giving. This is good news indeed!

At the January meeting, it was reported that Executive Council voted to support Property's motion to move forward with replacing the troubled lift with an elevator. Property is in the process of having CAD drawings of the building done, which is necessary prior to receiving bids for the work. These CAD drawings also are necessary for and will support the efforts of the HVAC Task Force as they move forward in identifying the needs for a new HVAC system.


A donor has offered \$40,000 toward the elevator project that currently has an estimated cost of \$125,000. As the discovery process continues, the congregation will be kept in the loop as to final costs, funding options and installation time frame.

Plymouth is an amazing place made possible by all those who serve on boards, committees, task forces, and those who volunteer whenever the call goes out. Any action you take, be it large or small, weekly, or once a year, contributes to making Plymouth the place that, "No matter who you are or where you are on life's journey, you are welcome here."
