From the Senior Pastor

Friends:

How's the family?

The question is asked often enough. And always it gives me pause. How does one offer courteous response, sparing details. Family ties are always knotted, even in the best of circumstances.

I hail from a small family, once largely confined to a couple of counties in central Ohio. Five or six generations are there, laid to rest in just a handful of cemeteries. I can visit them all, a string of grand and great-grand ancestors, in a couple of hours. My mother was an only child, which is a limiting family factor; my father's siblings provided a link to aunts and uncles and cousins. Only one of his family, my Aunt Marilyn, ever ventured beyond the hinterlands of Columbus. She dared move east to New Jersey for love's sake, which was wildly exotic when I was a child.

How's the family? The sphere is still small, but sprawled across more states than I ever could have imagined. My one sister lives in central Ohio. Her two children, my one niece and one nephew, live respectfully in North Carolina and Colorado. My oldest son and daughter-in- law recently moved from Duluth, Minnesota, to Los Angeles, California, where they are much involved with raising the lovely Gertrude, the one grandchild Vida and I periodically see via the wonders of Skype. We cheer from afar her latest crawling accomplishments. My youngest son is still at home, but soon plans on moving to an apartment in the West Central neighborhood of Fort Wayne. It is a step as significant as any other, with its own rippling effect.

How's the family? The question brings pause. Small by most standards, but large enough to acquaint me with love and imperfection. The pause lingers, for with my mounting years, I find the dead easily mingling with the living. I can still see my grandfather's work-worn hands, and smell his Vitalis hair tonic. I can feel grandmother's kisses upon my cheek. I can hear my parent's laughter. They have all been gone for so long. I need no Skype to draw them near.

How's your family? Not lacking in the complications that mark every family, I suppose. And wanting more the love, needing more the grace, praying more the mercy every family requires for life to thrive. No family is ever without need of these.

The second Sunday in May is designated on the church calendar as Festival of the Christian Home. It serves as reminder that we are part of an extended family, bound by faith, hope, and love. The following is a prayer that I composed this year for our use in worship. I hope you find it useful for the family setting that is uniquely yours.

O God, we thank You for family ties as conceived by Jesus, a kindred people united in spirit, bound by love. We thank you for mothers and fathers of faith who have nurtured and defended us when we were unknown to ourselves and uncertain of our future; we thank you for sisters and brothers who have surprised us with unexpected expressions of kindness and grace, meeting our need for understanding and encouragement. Grant us wisdom that we may play our part in advancing the peace that is your will, proclaiming gospel that is healing, hopeful, and a blessing for all the families of earth. Amen.

Just War Theory

The Peace and Justice Committee has taken on the task of attempting to explore and genuinely understand what Plymouth's commitment to just peace means, and how we, as a congregation, can incorporate its principles into our actions as a church and as individual members. Thus, we have done some research and wish to share with all of you what we have discovered. We are writing a three-part series in *The Bell* that examines the principles of just peace and how they have come to define Plymouth. The following is the first of these three segments. We hope that you find this series of articles both informative and thought-provoking.

In order to understand the true meaning of just peace, we must first look at the definition and implications of just war. First of all, it is important to note the two ideas are not opposites of each other but, rather, just peace is a response to just war; a phenomenon emerging from the ethical questions concerning why a nation should go to war, and how individuals and nations should conduct themselves during times of conflict.

Historically, the concept of just war came about as a means of justifying, controlling, and legitimizing acts of warfare. As Western societies became larger and more organized, a yearning to moralize war also developed. In this quest to define why society could and should go to war, two distinct theories emerged: the idea of Jus Ad Bellum, and the idea of Jus in Bello.

Jus Ad Bellum, or the right to go to war, can be thought of as just cause. For example, is a nation going to war for the greater purpose of peace? Is war sanctioned by a legitimate authority figure? Is war a last resort? Does going to war appear to have a reasonable hope for success? If all of these criteria are fulfilled, then Jus Ad Bellum has been met.

Jus in Bello, on the other hand, describes how nations and individuals should morally behave during war. These concepts state that a military should not target civilians or engage in acts of terrorism. Jus in Bello also promotes minimum use of force with minimum collateral damage that may impact the lives of civilians. If the impact on non-combatants is deemed to be too great to justify warfare, then a war, according to Jus in Bello, is unjust.

Although these theories seem sound on paper, the actuality of war, coupled with greed and new weapons of mass destruction, make just war theory very problematic, especially from a United Church of Christ (UCC) perspective. In the following weeks, we will continue to look at just peace. We explore how it has emerged as a UCC standard and how this affects our own church and lives. By understanding just peace, we will better be able to uphold its standards and transformative qualities in our daily life.

Foods Resource Bank Celebrates 10-Year Mission

For the past nine years, members and friends of Plymouth have joined with the congregation of Salem-Magley UCC to support the mission of Foods Resource Bank (FRB). This partnership continues into its tenth year in 2014! Plymouth's involvement was initiated by Doug and Gale Cunningham, and has continued with your tremendous support.

Plymouth's financial contributions over the last nine years total almost \$107,000—one of the largest benevolent efforts! Our contribution is added to that of Salem's members, along with the net profit from the sale of twenty acres of corn or soy beans, raised and harvested by the farmers of the Salem congregation. That nine-year amount given to FRB from our combined efforts totals \$225,228!

Our yearly donation is designated for FRB to develop educational and training programs in communities around the world that we have selected. The goal is to enable the indigenous populations to become self-sufficient and self-sustaining. Uganda Tseo (4 years), and Dominican Republic Bateyes (3 years), are our most recent designees.

The 20-acre corn crop for 2014 has been planted, and it is now our opportunity to share once again in this important mission. Each of us can make a valuable contribution. Our Executive Council has approved a project that will investigate how our congregation can become more energy efficient. When we embraced the mantle of being a green church, we embarked on a journey of being stewards of earth's resources--to recycle, reuse, and reduce our carbon footprint. Believe it or not, that is the *easy* part.

We are challenged to go to the next level of stewardship of our earth's resources by seeking new technology that will enable us to harness the most renewable source of energy—sunshine.

Towards that effort, we are asking all members to complete a survey on how you and your household use energy. For the next three Wednesdays and Sundays, before and after church, there will be computers set up in the Folsom Room to help you take the survey to see how you match up to being a good and efficient energy consumer. Once we have enough people completing the survey, we will ask you to participate in the project by pledging to reduce energy use. Not only will this project help you reduce your utility bill, but your pledge will make a difference in the health of God's creation. This is **Part One**.

Part Two investigates the feasibility of installing solar panels on our Christian Education roof. If we install solar panels on our roof, we literally become a power plant! Think about it—n ot only are we spiritually empowered by God inside our hallowed walls, but our solar panels will empower our buildings so we can have abundant, renewable energy.

Part Three stretches into the future. When we become a highly-efficient energy consuming community, through our example, we can energize other church communities. We can become a vital resource to other churches in Fort Wayne. Intentionally local with global impact.





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Mow only as often as you need to keep your lawn in good shape. For most lawns, that means cutting your grass no lower than 2.5 inches. Keeping many grasses as long as 3.5 inches is ideal for crowding out crab grass and other weeds.

Leave grass clippings on the lawn after you mow to provide your lawn with a natural (and free) source of nutrients, or compost the clippings for use in your garden.
