Rick Stoerker expressed appreciation for the years of leadership Lucy provided while serving as chairperson of the Peace and Justice Committee; he also called attention to Lucy's work with Habitat for Humanity, Northeast Indiana Friends of Public Education, and Cedars Hope, and her work as Study Connection Coordinator with Nebraska School. Tony Kell then presented Lucy with the special plaque of commendation.

From the Senior Pastor

Friends,

As a young boy, I was a big fan of the Detroit Tigers baseball team. My connection to the team came about primarily because of the radio. Ernie Harwell was the famed voice of the Tigers, and I found his call of the action on the field-of-play mesmerizing. Harwell's broadcasting career with the Tigers spanned forty-two years, and for a good portion of those years, I dialed in to listen.

I mention Ernie Harwell because he was known to begin the first broadcast of a new season by reciting words from the Song of Solomon 2:11-12 (KJV).

***"For lo, the winter is past,
the rain is over and gone;
the flowers appear on the earth;
the time of the singing of birds is come,
and the voice of the turtle is heard in our land."***

Harwell never sermonized when intoning these words; I don't recall that he ever quoted chapter or verse. He just offered a simple recitation that signaled a change of seasons. Listening in, you knew winter was waning and spring was soon to follow.

In worship, we've been weaving our way through Lent, the lengthening of days that lead to Holy Week and Easter. We have been reminded that our lives are woven with promises that speak of God being gracious, generous, merciful, and faithful. The promises of God convey hope. And hope is one of the most vital and resilient expressions of our faith. We live in hope that, amidst the volatility of our swift and changing seasons, God is subtly at work breathing life, bringing renewal to the earth and to our spirits.

Outside my office, winter's snow is now melting. The frigid air is gone, the chill is over. All signs point to the coming of spring. Earth's re-creation. And resurrection. I'm eager, so very eager, for the time of joyful singing to return. I'm listening intently for gospel whispers and alleluia anthems that magnify the love of Jesus, that herald life as designed by God for our good.

It is a promise of God that goodness and mercy shall endure. May this hope both sustain and inspire our efforts, as we journey through Lent, following the way of our crucified and risen Savior.

One of the songs we've been singing speaks:

***To the One who carves each one of us
with a beauty all our own.
To the one who weaves the web of life,
that we need not feel alone.
For creating recreation: time to rest, to play, to be.
For surrounding us with wonder, that we
through Your eyes might see.
We praise You, O God of inspiration.
We praise You, for breathing life through creation.***

The One we worship is at work in all the seasons of our lives. The God who weaves the web of life is always breathing life through creation. This is our hope and trust and prayer.

In a couple of weeks, we will observe Holy Week, which serves as a tapestry for the fidelity of Jesus, who stayed true to His calling through betrayal and denial, from the Upper Room to Gethsemane; from the Calvary of His death to the Garden of burial; and there also the mystery of the Empty Tomb and Resurrection: God at work, breathing life even into death.

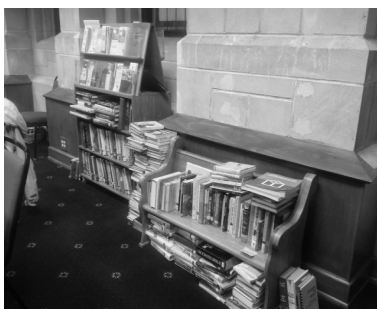
Library Resurrection!



Fresh life is being breathed into the church's library! A newly-formed Library Task Force has been hard at work since January on the Louise Folsom Memorial Library, housed in the Amistad Room. With the support and direction of the Christian Education Board (CE), the library is being given some much-needed attention. The CE

Board recognizes that good literature can be such a valuable part of our individual faith journeys and continued learning, but that sadly, this great church resource has long been under-utilized.

One of the first steps: a deep purging! The library has become over-crowded, not only with books that are outdated or no longer appealing, but also with many good books that just simply don't belong in a church library or that can easily be found elsewhere. These volumes are being removed and will soon be on display in the Folsom Room, available for members and friends to peruse and take home. Freewill donations will be accepted, and the proceeds will be used to purchase new books. We're happy to receive your suggestions for books that you would like to see on the shelves, so watch for those book tables and a suggestion box in late March or early April!

UCC Office Support Staff Network Annual Gathering at Plymouth

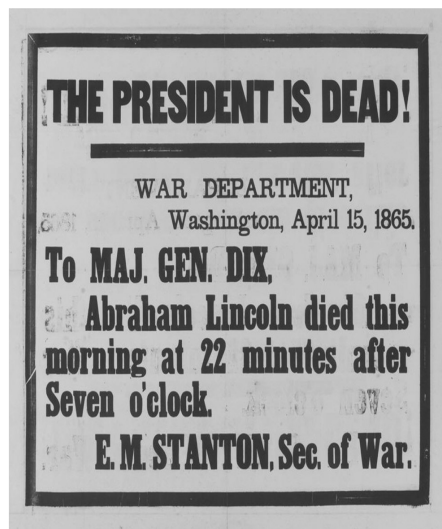

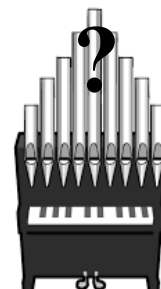

Cedars HOPE Offering To Be Received On Mothers' Day, Sunday, May 17

In 1993, Cedars HOPE, Inc. opened as an innovative housing concept in Fort Wayne. The concept was the result of a study conducted by a group of individuals from Plymouth Church concerned about the rising number of homeless women in Fort Wayne. Through their research, they discovered that older women with a serious mental illness were

over-represented in the homeless population, and that they could benefit from supportive permanent housing. Cedars HOPE, Inc. continues as the only permanent housing program in our area serving homeless women with a serious mental illness.

Mission: Cedars HOPE, Inc. is a not-for-profit organization serving homeless women living with serious mental illness by offering permanent:

Housing

Opportunities for growth and companionship

Personal support



Encouragement towards independence

Stable housing is the first step towards managing the debilitating symptoms of mental illness. In addition to ending episodes of homelessness for our residents and the associated cost to the community, their psychiatric emergencies are virtually eliminated.
