Benevolence in 2018

The Benevolence Committee would like to share with the Congregation the way that funds are to be allocated beginning with the 2018 grant cycle. Much thought, discussion and deliberation went into this decision and the committee feels that it has come to a good decision to leverage our limited monies to make a greater impact on the community and agencies we fund. We will request applications for one "Capacity Building Grant" in the amount of \$20,000.00 and additional grants in amounts ranging up to \$2,000.00.

There will be only one "Capacity Building Grant" awarded each year. Agencies will be informed that it will be a one-time grant. The application will need to clearly state how this \$20,000.00 grant will permanently impact and improve the agency's ability to carry on its mission while supporting Plymouth's four basic pillars: open and affirming; justice and peace for all people; sound ecological practices; and support for missions both locally and worldwide.

The Benevolence Committee will be giving out fewer grants in 2018 with the focus of having a greater impact on those that receive Plymouth Benevolence Grants.




In India, Anjala's transformation inspires other women to farm

Foods Resource Bank's India-Namkum program # 1503 Led by Mennonite Central Committee and local partner South Vihar Welfare Society for Tribals

Anjala, 42, has undergone a transformation in her livelihood and outlook and her standing in her community. Just a year ago, she was a day laborer whose family couldn't make ends meet. Now she is a successful farmer and a role model for other women in FRB's India-Namkum program. The program focuses on food security and livelihood training, and includes organic farming, water harvesting, wasteland development, and gender equity awareness to keep people — especially women — on their farms rather than seeking wages in towns and cities.

Villagers like Anjala and her family had not been able to grow enough food on their land because of insufficient farming knowledge, lack of water, unpredictable rainfall patterns, and little access to seeds and other inputs. They worked on their farms for 6 months of the year, then looked for paid work elsewhere. Low compensation and underemployment (on average, they may be employed for



less than two weeks a month) merely served to prolong their poverty and hunger.

Anjala and her husband, Robin, have two teenaged children. Robin works in a factory, but even with his income they weren't able to cover all the family's expenses. Anjala joined a self-help group (SHG) in their village. She participated in all the member meetings and trainings on such topics as kitchen gardening, vermi-composting, agriculture, vegetable cultivation, pig raising, income generation, leadership development, and more. She began growing a variety of crops and vegetables on the family's 3.5 acres.

She is happy working in the fields and putting her learning into practice. Her children help out, as does her husband during his holidays. She cultivates wheat on 1.5 acres, using System of Wheat Intensification methods: transplanting young and strong seedlings in prescribed spacing to save on seed and water, and "trap cropping" – planting mustard between rows to draw insects away from the crop. Anjala grows cabbage, cauliflower, radish, spinach, wheat, mustard, and peas in season, and uses the community well to irrigate a second crop during the winter growing season.

Anjala has become a role model among the village women and girls. She motivates them to stay in the village and farm rather than migrating to look for work as domestic help, where they run a high risk of trafficking. She encourages them to join SHGs and improve their livelihoods and living conditions through agriculture.

India Namkum encompasses 5 communities, 684 households, and 3398 individuals

Climate Boot Camp at Plymouth Church

Thursday, September 14, 2017 9:00 am—3:30 pm

The environmental challenges facing Indiana—and our world—are real and pressing. In fact, for people of faith, they have created a moral imperative.

Weather disruptions hurt the most disadvantaged: people who have contributed least to pollution and have the fewest resources for protecting themselves, are often hit the worst. But there is hope: the more we talk about it, the likelier it will be that we ourselves, other citizens, and leaders will act.

Climate Boot Camp is an in-depth workshop sponsored by Hoosier Interfaith Power & Light (www.hoosieripl.org) to equip faith leaders and members to speak confidently and knowledgeably about environmental issues, including climate change and its impacts, and to respond wisely to these challenges. The workshop covers scientific, theological, economic, and pastoral dimensions of the crisis, and offers space for conversation and for planning and implementing specific projects.

Clergy and teachers are especially urged to attend, and all concerned folks are welcome. The workshop is led by IU climate scientist Dr. Ben Brabson, the Rev. Wyatt Watkins, pastor of Cumberland First Baptist Church, Indy, and the Rev. Dr. Trisha Tull, environmental theologian and H-IPL's program facilitator.

JSOR Event at Plymouth, October 27 & 28

The Q Gospel, Thomas, and the Lost Wisdom of Jesus: Two non-canonical gospels--the Q Gospel and the Gospel of Thomas--are reshaping the way scholars understand Jesus and the early years of the movement he started in Galilee nearly 2000 years ago. Both are "wisdom" gospels, that is to say, gospels in which Jesus appears in the role of sage and prophet. Is this ancient wisdom relevant to anyone living in the modern world?

Speakers

Robert J. Miller (Ph.D., Claremont Graduate School) is Rosenberger Professor of Religious Studies and Christian Thought at Juniata College in Pennsylvania. He is the author of several books including *Helping Jesus Fulfill Prophecy* (2016), and editor of *The Complete Gospel Parallels* (with Arthur Dewey, 2012) and *The Complete Gospels* (4th ed. 2010).

Stephen J. Patterson (Ph.D., Claremont Graduate School) is Geo. H. Atkinson Professor of Religious and Ethical Studies at Willamette University. He is the author of many books, most recently *The Lost Way: How Two Forgotten Gospels Are Rewriting the Story of Christian Origins* (2014).

Program Details

Q and Thomas: The Lost Gospels, Friday evening, 7:30-9:00 pm

What is Q, and why does it matter? What is the Gospel of Thomas, and what do we learn from this fifth gospel that we do not learn from Matthew, Mark, Luke and John? And why are these gospels reshaping the way scholars understand Jesus? In this opening session, Robert Miller and Stephen Patterson will bring you up to speed on what we know (and don't know) about the lost gospels.

The Q Gospel: A Galilean Gospel? Saturday 9:30-10:30 am

The Q Gospel is arguably the first gospel, composed in Jesus' own Galilean homeland. But this gospel is still lost. So how do we know it existed? How do we know what was in it? Robert Miller will explain what we *do* know about Q, and how that changes the way we understand the story of Christian origins.

Thomas: Plato's Gospel, Saturday 11 am-noon

The Surprise discovery of the Gospel of Thomas in 1945 is an event unrivaled in the study of Christian origins. Who wrote it? Where was it written? And why does it sound so different from the canonical gospels? Stephen Patterson will unlock the secrets of this gospel (some of them!) and explain what this new gospel really tells us about early Christianity.

Ouestions and Answers on O and Thomas, Saturday 1:30-2:30 pm

In this session, Patterson and Miller will focus on your questions and ideas about these mysterious gospels.

The Wisdom of Jesus in the Modern World, Saturday 3-4 pm

In the Q gospel and the Gospel of Thomas, Jesus appears in the role of sage and prophet. How could the wisdom of this ancient sage be relevant to someone living in the modern world? Why should Christians take note? What about those who have given up on organized religion? What gems are worth recovering from these lost gospels?
