The capital campaign is officially underway after the individuals directly involved in the various campaign committees were commissioned, on **Sunday, January 10**. Our logo, **HERE, for Good!** and theme, "**Living, Giving & Building Community,** will drive everything the campaign does over the next few months. We are busy creating and printing informational materials, which we think will help you better understand the infrastructure needs we are planning to fund through the monies raised in this campaign.

If you have not been aware of these needs, we must replace our ancient boiler and upgrade our entire HVAC system - as well as replace the roof on our sanctuary, which is beyond it's expected life span. The expected cost of all of this is around \$2,500,000.

Yet, more importantly, we believe these materials speak well to why we are addressing the infrastructure needs we face, which is: Plymouth Church remains a beacon of faith being lived to its fullest; a place where doubt, thoughts, and questions are welcome; a sacred place that is open and affirming; a wise place where we try to find new ways to be good stewards of our environment; a sanctuary for peace and a generous people sharing their time, talent, and treasure—locally and globally.

From the Senior Pastor

Friends,

In anticipation of the holiday celebrating the birth of Martin Luther King, Jr., the Justice and Witness Ministry (JWM) of the United Church of Christ encouraged people to participate in seven days of reading from a wide range of King's writings. The JWM expressed concern that celebrations of King's life are frequently reduced to snippets of his "I Have a Dream" speech. According to scholar Michael Eric Dyson, the Dream speech can be overemphasized. If the Dream speech is the sole source for understanding King's life and ministry, then it serves to dull the luster, to eclipse a full measure of his significance.

Among the resources suggested by JWM was a list of five "underappreciated speeches and sermons" by King. I picked one to re-read this past week, King's speech, "Remaining Awake through a Great Revolution," delivered at the National Cathedral in Washington, D.C., on March 31, 1968. It serves to remind: spending time in the written work of Dr. King is always rewarding, always inspiring.

In this particular speech, King revisited the well-known Washington Irving story that features Rip Van Winkle. King was intrigued, not simply that Rip Van Winkle slept for twenty years, but that he slept through the American Revolution. Rip nodded-off during the reign of the dreaded sovereign, King George; he awoke when George Washington was serving as president. Van Winkle found himself utterly amazed and completely lost. King's comment: "one of the great liabilities of life is that all too many people find themselves living amid a great period of social change, and yet they fail to develop the new attitudes, the new mental responses, that the new situation demands. They end up sleeping through a revolution."

King was aware of living, not simply in a revolutionary time, but in the complexities of a triple revolution. He mentioned (1) a **technological revolution** (the impact of automation and what he called "cybernation;" (2) a **revolution in weaponry** (the threat posed by atomic and nuclear weapons; and (3) a **human rights revolution** (what he called "**the freedom explosion**" taking place all other the world).

We must, in King's words, "seek to transform the jangling discords of our nation into a beautiful symphony of humanity working together for good."

Some sections of the "Remaining Awake" speech are dated and riveted in the past. But King's analysis of a triple revolution was remarkably perceptive. The revolutionary forces impacting life in King's day continue to exist in our own. And the challenge posed by King remains strikingly relevant: we can either withdraw into dull and silent lives, or we can muster the resources of faith, hope, and love to bring about the kind of community that fosters justice and peace in keeping with God's design. We must, in King's words, "seek to transform the jangling discords of our nation into a beautiful symphony of humanity working together for good."

Human progress, King often reminded, "never rolls in on the wheels of inevitability." Advancement of the beloved community comes through tireless effort, the persistent work of individuals, who are "willing to be co-workers with God." Without such resolve, we ally ourselves to the primitive forces of social stagnation.

Like King before us, we face the jangling discords of war, poverty, and racism. And like King, when awake and aware of the revolutionary times in which we live, we are called upon to advance the kingdom of God. Let us not disappoint. May God grant us courage to seek the magnificent development set before us in the love and peace of Jesus Christ.

The Grants and Scholarships Committee has the pleasant responsibility of awarding scholarship grants for **tuition and fees** from the earnings generated by several endowed funds. Completed applications are due in the church office as noted below.

By February 15

The **Richard Nelson Kent Memorial Fund** provides educational grants for tuition and fees for members of the United Church of Christ in the Northeast [Indiana] Association and other qualified applicants who are at least 16 years of age and entering into or continuing ecological studies, conservation biology, or other environmentally related studies.

The **R. Donald and Genevieve M. Sinish Fund** provides awards for tuition and fees for 16-to-24-year-old members of Plymouth Church.

The **Van Gorder Scholarship** is awarded annually for tuition and fees for post-secondary education leading to a degree, certificate, or license for a graduating senior who is a member of Plymouth Church.

By April 15

The **Richard C. Hess Peace Studies Scholarship** will award a \$1,000 tuition and fees scholarship for a college student majoring in peace studies or a related program.

Completed applications with all supporting materials must be received in the church office by the stated deadline. Incomplete applications are ineligible for consideration.

Philip Gulley – 2016 Parry Lecturer

Plymouth Church will be hosting Philip Gulley as a Parry Lecturer the weekend of **February 27-28**. The title for Gulley's lecture is, "The Awakened Soul." The lecture will be delivered on **Saturday at 4:30 pm** (he also will be preaching on Sunday at the **10:00 am** worship service). Plan on arriving early (4:00 pm) for coffee, tea, and crumpets!



Philip Gulley is a Quaker pastor, writer, and theologian. He has been described as an "eclectic writer", and has published 20 books of both fiction and nonfiction. Titles of his work include:

I Love You, Miss Huddleston: And Other Inappropriate Longings of My Indiana Childhood (a memoir of his coming-ofage in Danville, Indiana); If the Church were Christian; Living the Quaker Way: Timeless Wisdom for a Better Life Today; and The Evolution of Faith. Along with James Mulholland he also coauthored, If Grace is True and If God is Love.

Gulley's early work prompted Paul Harvey, the popular radio host, to comment, "Through deft storytelling and his own irresistible brand of humor, Phil Gulley explores the depths of the Heartland's heart."

More recently, responding to Gulley's book, *The Evolution of Faith*, Diana Bulter Bass said: "No one raises more provocative questions about Christianity more kindly than Philip Gulley."
