Plymouth Officially Under Construction

The construction project on the new HVAC system that is to be installed has begun! The boiler has been shut down, and the removal process is taking place over the next few weeks.

- ***If you have respiratory issues***, please be alerted that you may want to stay out of the office building for the time being.
- Depending upon the weather, the church may feel cool at times until warm weather is here to stay.
- This summer, the temperature inside may be warmer than usual at times in certain locations due to renovations to the air conditioning systems.
- No hot water is available in the building until further notice.
- Some restrooms may be closed temporarily.
- Some areas may have limited or no access for a period of time.
- There will be some noise, dust, and extra workers in the building throughout the project, which is expected to be completed in early-to-mid October.
- When scheduling events, staff cannot guarantee what the future condition of any rooms will be.

A construction schedule is posted on the bulletin board outside the main office to give everyone an idea of what is happening and when.

Schedules may have to be modified and changed at times during a project such as this, so it may not be always be 100% accurate. Please check with the church office if you have a meeting or activity scheduled to see if your reserved location will be affected by the construction. You may possibly need to make alternative arrangements.

Your patience and understanding for the minor inconveniences we will all experience during the duration of the project is something we are all counting on. The end result will be a much more efficient and comfortable building for everyone.

From the Senior Pastor

Friends,

We officially concluded the most visible part of our **2016 Capital Fund Campaign** on Sunday, April 17. While I don't want to overstate what we have experienced, I can't help but think this has been an epic endeavor in the life of Plymouth Church. Few generations in the history of Plymouth Church have been so challenged. Our campaign goal was exceedingly ambitious (\$2.5 million), and our ability to meet this funding target was all but certain. Yet Plymouth members and friends have responded in a most positive manner.

In the most recent update I've received, it was reported that we have received over 130 pledges totaling just over \$1.62 million. With an additional allocation of \$165,000 from cash reserves designated for the capital campaign, our total now stands at \$1,785,000. Yes, we still have a way to go to meet our goal. Even so, I consider this a tremendous response and show of support.

I commend the leadership that has guided us to this point. The Capital Campaign Leadership Committee has worked exceptionally well together under the astute guidance of **Steve Hollingsworth**. Committee Chairpersons included **Kathryn Diekhoff**, Correspondence; **Laura and Rhys Rudolph**, Lead Gifts; **Beth Walker**, Printed Materials; **Eric Miller**, Publicity Committee; **Kathy Kolb**, Pre-Decision Parties; and **Eric Black**, Continuity. People and their committees spearheaded the campaign, discharging their assignments in a timely and responsible manner. **Randy Roberts**, Chairperson of the Stewardship & Finance Board, took the lead in helping Plymouth secure a bridge loan from PNC. Randy additionally was responsible for writing a special grant request to the English, Bonter, Mitchell Foundation. So, this campaign has been a large-scale group effort. And the result is a large-scale Plymouth Church accomplishment.

Construction is moving along at a rather swift pace. The boilers we intend to replace have already been removed from the premises. Asbestos abatement is underway. Church staff are being asked to change normal working routines. **Lettie Eagar** has adjusted her hours to ensure the church is open for work to proceed Monday through Friday of each week. **Rev. Ruth** needs to temporarily relocate her office space. Everyone is being impacted in one way or another. And everyone is asked to be patient and understanding of construction inconvenience, i.e. the sights and smells that accompany demolition. Then there is the dust – lots of dust is wafting through the building from sawing and drilling that are required for work to proceed.

What is clear now is that we are “**HERE, for Good.**” It is equally clear is that we are “**Living, Giving, Building Community.**” So I'm applauding all Plymouth members and friends who have extended themselves that we might meet the challenges we face. But first and foremost, I'm thanking God—for all that we have accomplished, and for the positive outlook that prevails.

Congratulations to Allen Haynes, Licensed Minister

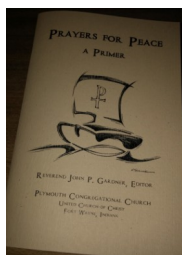

IN-KY Conference UCC 2016 Annual Gathering CWS Hygiene Kits Service Project *Plymouth Goal: 500 Toothbrushes*



In the face of natural disasters, violence, or grinding poverty, Hygiene Kits can mean the difference between sickness and health for struggling families.

This year at the IKC Annual Gathering, a few people will be helped when 1,000 Hygiene Kits are created to share with Church World Service.

We all know we are stronger when we work together. Therefore, each association is being asked to collect specific items for this project. Richard C. Hess Peace Studies Scholarship

The Peace and Justice Committee is pleased to announce two recipients of the 2015-16 Peace Studies Scholarship.

David Grim, one of our own members, is the eleventh recipient of a scholarship. This scholarship for David is given in memory of Roberta Stoerker Clair, who was a member of Plymouth. She graduated from Union Theological Seminary and was a peace and justice advocate all of her life. This fall, David begins work toward a Master's of Divinity from the Chicago Theological Seminary. The committee is pleased to support David as he seeks to enhance justice and peace through his studies from the Seminary. As David stated, "It was known to the ancients and it is known today, that peace is a transforming work. It calls us from common anxieties and animosities to uncommon cunning and compassion. ... My goals of theological study are bound up with the studies of peace and justice." We are confident that David's studies will guide him to lifelong work in promoting justice and peace.

The twelfth scholarship is awarded to **Hashem Abushama**, who is a senior at Earlham College, majoring in Peace and Global Studies. A Palestinian from the Arroub refugee camp, Hashem has served as a youth ambassador and speaker to the United Nations, as a participant in the Seeds of Peace summer camp in Maine, as President of the Earlham Student Government, and currently as an intern in Ireland with Syrian refugees there. He is the youngest of nine children and working his way through college. Hashem's goal is to return to Palestine to begin a youth program in his home area and continue to be a spokesperson for justice. He wants to ensure that Palestinian children in the future will not "breathe the air of tear gas, but have safety and peace. ... I want them to have their freedom and enhance it by respecting the freedom of others." Both of Hashem's references predict that he will make a major impact on social justice issues. With the scholarship, we are delighted to be able to encourage Hashem as he completes his educational goals.

“Earthwise” Minute

A few weeks ago, Plymouth Church was forwarded a copy of the 2015 Annual Report of the Allen County Solid Waste Management District. The report included the following: Last year, Allen County businesses and residents diverted 152,608.1 tons of material from the landfill; 730,840 pounds of electronic equipment was recycled; 10 tons of batteries were recycled; and 204 lbs. of mercury was collected from tube fluorescent light bulbs, thermometers, thermostats, and button cell batteries.

Recycling makes a difference! It is an alternative to the “take, use, discard, and repeat” lifestyle that threatens the health of earth, air, water. And humans.

So remember: REDUCE. REUSE. RECYCLE.

Your thoughtful participation will help maintain Plymouth Church’s commitment to being a “green” church.

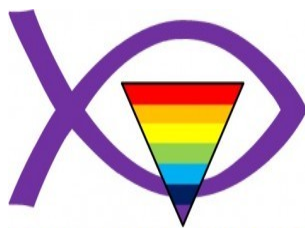

Lisa's Legacy: "*Compassionate Conversations and Hope*"

As many of you may know, Lisa Filler passed away last November. As her family, our world was turned upside down, but the value of friendship was never more clear to us. Many people, especially from Plymouth, helped in our time of need, from the funeral and ensuing meal, to making sure our needs were met, extending their heartfelt sympathy, engaging us in conversation, or when we simply needed someone to sit beside us.

A week after the funeral, a friend brought us a gift bag. In it was a beautifully illustrated picture book, a heart touchstone for each of us and a list of grief support groups and counselors in Fort Wayne. A month after the funeral, two friends came to our house, bringing soup and salad, and adult coloring pages. During both of those visits, we reminisced about Lisa and laughed and cried. It was so uplifting for us to share our memories.

Too often, our own good intentions of offering support for others fall away because we aren't sure how to help. Not only were we grateful for the outpouring of love and compassion shown to us during our dark time, we were inspired. We are in the process of putting together kits entitled "***Lisa's Legacy: Compassionate Conversations and Hope***" to help others, as they experience grief.

The kits, each in a royal blue cloth bag, are comprised of comforting and useful items for a grieving family or person. It is intended that the kit would be brought to the recipient after the busyness of the funeral has passed, but those who are grieving would still want compassionate conversation about their loved one. As a help to the person giving the kit, a page of conversation starters and suggested things to say and do will be included in the kit.

We are asking the congregation of Plymouth Church to help pilot these kits. If you know of a family member, friend, or neighbor who has recently lost a loved one, please let Rev. John Gardner, Rev. Ruth Philips, or Rev. Carole Green know, and they can help you get one of these kits. The kits will be funded through corporate and individual donations and gifts of in-kind services and goods, so that there will be no cost to the giver or the recipient.

The kits are intentionally being assembled in a secular manner in order to have a broad outreach. However, if you wish to add something of a spiritual nature, please let John, Ruth or Carole know beforehand so that, as we pilot the kits, we will know if something has been added. We would also like to have your feedback after you have given a Lisa Legacy Kit so we will know what direction to go after this trial program. The kits will be available after the beginning of June.

We are truly grateful to Plymouth Church for your help and support with this endeavor.
