Currently, he is a part-time Multicultural Activities Coordinator at Huntington University. Kyle already has made a difference working with students to offer a wide variety of multicultural experiences. ## Ministry with the 21st Century Child

A workshop on the topic of the 21st Century Child was sponsored by the Lilly-funded Center for Congregations on April 25, here in Fort Wayne. Barb Duch, Carol Jackson, Karen Nesius Roeger, Cammy Sutter, and I attended on behalf of Christian Education Board. Presenter for the day was Ivy Beckwith, a lifetime church professional in ministry with children and youth.

The Millenials and Generation Z are the "plugged in" generations, the "Digital Natives."

"Today's students - K through college represent the first generations to grow up with this new technology. They have spent their entire lives surrounded by and using computers, videogames, digital music players, video cameras, cell phones and all the other toys and tools of the digital age ..." "... it is now clear that as a result of this ubiquitous environment and the sheer volume of their interaction with it, today's students think and process information fundamentally different from their predecessors. These differences go further and deeper than most educators suspect or realize..." "... it is very likely that our students' brains have physically changed and are different from ours as a result of how they grew up."

We were reminded that children learn from every relationship and every interaction with the people and content of their world – e.g. church. We need to be consistently intentional about the ways we include children in the life of the congregation. We all must be cognizant of how and what we are teaching them about life in the community of faith. We have new challenges as Church to understand and respond in meaningful ways to these generations within our midst.

The summer months are always busy, as many of you are travelling, enjoying time at the lake and with family and friends, and running busy children to ball games, band practices, summer camps, and assorted other activities. We have identified this time as a great opportunity to experiment with some new electronic communications tools and formats. We are very excited about the prospects for this type of communication. Hopefully, this summer will allow us to define and *refine* how we share Plymouth's joys and concerns, events and activities, and our continuing mission work here in our own church and in the broader community. Since part of Plymouth's mission is to be strong environmental stewards, reducing the amount of printed material we produce this summer will definitely support this effort. And the decrease in postage and materials costs will help us be better financial stewards of our church's resources.

#### From the Senior Pastor

Friends,

Plymouth's participation in the UCC program,  $Mission\ 4/1\ Earth-50\ Great\ Days\ (April\ 1-May\ 19)$  has really captured my interest. As various materials and handouts have reminded, we have joined with other participating UCC congregations in promoting earth care and environmental integrity. The effort, urging church members to be conscientious and involved stewards of creation, is dedicated to proclaiming gospel in practical, visible, and life-changing ways. How wonderful!

The challenges posed by climate change and global warming are daunting and often overwhelming. The most recent issue of *Sojourner's* Magazine argues that global warming "is a clear and present danger – with perpetrators, victims, and most important, solutions." (see "Licking Climate Change," *Sojourner's*, May, 2013).

Mission 4/1 Earth acknowledges the present danger, while accenting solutions. As Christine Leggett reminded us recently in worship: "We can green up, power down, and shout out for the environment."

Mission 4/1 Earth has strategically focused upon three goals: (1) to tally 1 million hours of earth care; (2) to plant 100,000 trees; and (3) to write 100,000 letters of environmental advocacy to elected officials.

It's the numbers that have drawn my attention. I've personally logged a few hours of earth care (primarily recycling), planted one tree, and written three letters. This isn't much in the large scheme of solutions. But when considering how others are involved, the situation changes. As of **Sunday, May 5**, Plymouth members had accumulated the following: 1,337 hours of earth care; 129 trees planted; and 52 letters written and sent. And Plymouth's contribution to the mission gets combined with that which is taking place within other UCC congregations. The UCC website most recently reported 179,269 hours of earth care; 35,203 trees planted; and 17, 565 letters written and sent



At this junction, it doesn't look like the national goals for *Mission 4/1 Earth* will be met. But meeting the goals, I sense, was never the point of this urgent endeavor. What *Mission 4/1 Earth* has forcefully illustrated is the power and inspiration of collective action. Everyone can contribute something and become part of the solution to the environment perils we face.

Together, we can accomplish far more than if working alone. In concert, as Christians committed to prudent and respectful use of the world and it's resources, we can make a difference for good!

A few days yet remain in *Mission 4/1 Earth*. Keep the count growing! And may God be praised!

### **Children's Fellowship Time (CFT)**

Greetings! Grace and peace from the growing hearts and hands of our children here at Plymouth Church. It is such a blessing for the young and growing ones in our midst to join together in Children's Fellowship Time (CFT) during our brief 20 minutes or so during Sunday worship.

We are being and playing joyfully together and making great friends! In CFT we provide a brief Christian fellowship time for our first through fifth graders to get to know each other and to have some simple structured activity. While the adults are listening to the sermon, our children are weaving bonds of friendship as part of the fabric of our church. Here's what we do on a typical Sunday:

#### **Meet and Greet:**

When we depart the sanctuary after the peace candle prayer, we meet in the Amistad Room. Each child is welcomed by name, visitors are greeted warmly, and everyone is invited to find a seat. Each child is made to feel important and at-home.

#### **Heart Focus:**

Before breaking out the activities, the adult leader prompts a short group discussion about what has been on the kids' minds that week. Christian themes and faith values are often mentioned by the leader in simple, understandable ways. The children are encouraged to speak from their hearts about school, play, life in general, etc.

#### **Seated Activities:**

After group discussion, the quietest table gets to choose first from the activity box. Here, the children may choose to enjoy board games, activity sheets, drawing, or reading story books. The adult(s) is attentive to making sure everyone is being included and having a good time.

#### **Special Activities:**

From time to time, a church member may have something special to share with the kids. It may be a liturgical dance, a Bible story book, a song, sharing about a church project.

Our time together goes very quickly and soon we return to worship during the offertory, New children in worship are always welcome to join us. Feel free to speak with me, share your ideas, and ask any questions you may have.
