2014 Amistad Award: Dr. Carl Jylland-Halverson

The 2014 Amistad Peace and Justice Award was given **March 9** to Dr. Carl W. Jylland-Halverson, Professor and Director of the Clinical Mental Health Counseling program in the Department of Psychology and Counseling at the University of Saint Francis.



Dr. Jylland-Halverson came to USF in 2000, and

through his work as a mental health advocate with the American Red Cross, he participated in disaster relief at Ground Zero in New York City, and for natural disasters, including Hurricane Katrina. He also has worked in Fort Wayne with Saints on the Streets, an urban street ministry for homeless persons. He is also the founder and academic advisor for USF-Love146 Task Force, a group that works with international organization Love146 to raise public awareness about human trafficking and to advocate for the exploited.

To complete his field study for an M.A. in theology, Dr. Jylland-Halverson participated in a Homelessness Immersion Project at Emmaus Ministries, which is an ecumenical urban ministry in Chicago for homeless males who participate in prostitution or survival sex. After his presentation on homeless youth at the Adler School of Professional Psychology, and at the International Christian Alliance on Prostitution's global conference, Dr. Jylland-Halverson was invited to provide training for counselors working with human trafficking in Nepal. In summer 2012, Dr. Jylland-Halverson worked with agencies in Kathmandu that rescue women and children from human trafficking; worked with clients and staff at "The Well" in Bangkok, a ministry for women who had participated in prostitution; spent time with agencies that provide vocational training for ladyboys and minister to men who visit brothels; and provided training for workers at Indian agencies that provide services for human trafficking survivors, widows, orphans, exploited men and boys, and hijas (eunuchs). At Universiti of Malaysia, Dr. Jylland-Halverson presented on the importance of self-care when working with human trafficking, and he was also a co-presenter at the Tata Institute for Social Sciences in Mumbai.

Since returning to the U.S., Dr. Jylland-Halverson has continued to be involved in interfaith dialogue through active membership in the Muslim-Christian Forum and participating in events with the Muslim, Sikh, Buddhist, and Bahia faith communities in Fort Wayne.

Dr. Jylland-Halverson's local and global work draws attention to those who too often are overlooked and to those who provide them with care and love. His work exemplifies the ecumenical mission of social justice and peace for all that is the foundation of the Amistad Award.

"As disciples of Jesus Christ, we are called to struggle against everything that leads us astray from the love of God and neighbor. Repentance, fasting, prayer, study, and works of love help us return to the love that rightly measures life in the body of Christ. Therefore, let us recommit ourselves to love of God and neighbor by confessing our sin and asking God for strength to persevere in our Lenten discipline." (Book of Worship – UCC)

Friends,

The above prayer was part of our Ash Wednesday liturgy this past week. I found it helpful in clarifying the significance of Lent, the church season that bids disciples to pay extra attention, to expend extra effort, to honor the Jesus way.

There is much that "**leads us astray**." Fear is always a deterrent to faith. The human mind, as Calvin noted, is a "**perpetual factory of idols**." The screens we carry are constantly beeping and blinking. Beguiling images serve to entertain the eye while dulling the mind. Boutique gospel scams are always popping up, promising more for less. Salvation gets massaged, worked over, shrink-wrapped, and packaged in pamphlets with three easy steps promising joy out of this world. Lent sounds an alarm that we might be led to life in this world, that we might be drawn afresh to love God and neighbor.

In his book, *A Pilgrim People*, John H. Westerhoff, III, wrote: "**The manner in which we order and use time is the best indicator of what is important to us**." How might we order and use our time in Lent? Peter Gomes, I recall, once suggested that a good Lent could be organized around three "S's: Silence, Study, and Service. He composed a schedule that called for 15-minutes of silence (Monday), 15 minutes of study (Wednesday), and 15 minutes of service (Friday). Each "off day" was time to keep a diary or journal, reflecting upon what was being planned or experienced. Gomes also rightly reminded: the Sundays of Lent are a time to rest from the rigors of whatever spiritual discipline we embrace.

Our Lenten theme this year is "Mourning to Morning: New Mercies We See." On Sunday morning of each week, we will share in singing: "I'm determined to walk with Jesus, yes, I am." On Wednesday evening of each week, I'll be offering a study of Brian McLaren's book, *A New Kind of Christianity*. The worship and study opportunities are examples of ways you might be involved in Lenten discipline. However you may choose to observe Lent, I hope and trust it brings meaning-ful renewal. May our determined walk with Jesus find us in a closer walk with God – for our good and the good of our neighbor, and for the glory of God.

Indiana-Kentucky Conference Delegation's 2014 Mission to Chile



On January 5, 2014, Scott, Amy, and myself landed in Santiago, Chile. We comprised the Indiana-Kentucky Conference (IKC) delegation to Chile. We were met by Elena, a Global Missions missionary, who served as our guide and translator. Pastore Viviana, the new director of the Shalom Center, also was with Elena. We spent the night at Elena's home in Talca, Chile. Next day, after the arrival of the staff of Centro Shalom, we all left for the Center.

The Shalom Center (Centro Shalom) is a camp retreat center sponsored by the IKC and our partner church, the Pentecostal Church of Chile, which is located in a lovely spot in the lower Andes Mountains. It is surrounded by trees, and the only access is a dirt road. The center is very serene and peaceful; a place to com-

mune with God. There is no electricity, no phone service; however, there is running water, which flows by gravity from atop a mountain.

For the next two days, we worked with the staff preparing the camp for the arrival of a group of young adults from the Curico, Chile, Church. After the Chileans arrived, the whole group, except for the two cooks, was divided into three teams. Our daily schedule: devotions, breakfast, group conversation (which included journaling time), work period, lunch, rest period, work period, personal cleanup time, and evening meal, followed by some sort of night activity. While working, we cleaned, repaired, painted, cleared brush, and inventoried tools and equipment.

The final two nights we were in Chile were spent in a home stay. Amy and I were together in one home and Scott

was in another. On Sunday, January 12, we went to church at the Bishop of the Pentecostal Church of Chile's home-base church. Many people were from the "daughter" churches, and the procession of worshippers entering into the Bishop's church was a sight to behold. They sang and played instruments as they processed into the church.



Scott had been asked to preach at

the service, and Elena translated for the congregation. Also, the whole group from Centro Shalom had been asked to sing a song during worship. The service was very much like ours, except all knelt for prayers, and the congregation processed to bring their offerings to the altar.

For me, this was much more a spiritual mission rather than a work-oriented one. We did work, but it seems the fundamental goal was for Chileans and Americans to be together and learn from each other. It's really interesting how peoples from different cultures, who can barely communicate in the others' language, can form very close bonds in less than a week. The

Chileans, at least those with whom I came in contact, were truly compassionate, friendly, and concerned with each other's wellbeing. As I was the oldest person at the Shalom Center, I was really well-cared for. The group was constantly making sure that I was okay.

I'm really glad that I was able to take this mission trip, which was sponsored in part, by a grant from Plymouth's Emma Feigley fund.

Mission Trip to Guatemala A Dream Come True

Hello everyone!

I wanted to write you this note to thank you for your support of my recent trip to Guatemala and to share with you some of what I experienced while there. My dream had been to take a mission trip to a Spanish-speaking country, and in January, I had the opportunity to realize that dream by going to Guatemala with an organization called Guatemala Esperanza (It is run by a Registered Nurse named Ron Noecker). A grant from the Emma Feigley Missions Fund, through Plymouth Benevolence, made it possible for me to help fund our projects.



I was very excited about the opportunity to use my language and healthcare skills. It was a mindopening and, at times, challenging trip. Yet, the beauty was overwhelming, and the group I was with was wonderful.

Our trip started in the colonial city of Antigua, a UNESCO World Heritage Site. The city features cobblestone streets, stately ruins left from the earthquakes of the late 1700s, and gorgeous views of the Agua volcano. In Antigua, we met with former U.S. Counsel General Sue Patterson, who gave us an overview on Guatemala. She runs a non-profit called WINGS, which provides health education and family planning to the most impoverished areas of Guatemala. Sue told us that the country is still recovering from the 36-year civil war that ended in the mid-1990s. Corruption is rampant within the government, army, and justice systems, and more than half the country lives in poverty.

There is a large indigenous population that speaks only Mayan languages. There is widespread undernourishment, resulting in decreased IQs. There is a resistance to birth control for religious reasons, misinformation, and superstition.



Our first project was to run a wellness clinic for the children of the wonderful LaVosi School for the deaf. We checked 28 students, some of whom had never had access to healthcare before! There's a general prejudice against the deaf in Guatemala, yet thanks to the school, we found these children to be full of happiness and hope.





Our next project was to help build a health clinic in Candelaria of San Martin, a rural village of indigenous people. The clinic was finished in

two days and ended with a beautiful ceremony of gratitude from the community. We also participated in a healthcare conference with the local healthcare workers. These projects are run by People of Guatemala, a fascinating non-profit that is assisting the communities of San Martin County to self-sufficiency. We had the opportunity to visit three local homes. There were three rooms in each home for 7 to 10 people, no running water, cooking over wood fires in the kitchens, and outdoor latrines, yet these women were proud and welcomed us warmly.

We then traveled to Lake Atitlan, a breathtakingly beautiful volcanic lake. We helped out and observed the running of a clinic in the Mayan village of Solola. Many of these patients spoke only the local Mayan dialect. We visited a community-driven vocational education center in Santa Cruz, for people of all ages, even school-age children, to learn skills to find jobs or start businesses of their own.





We appreciated that we were seeing the fruition of many years of hard work on these projects. We felt blessed and humbled to be included. Interacting with

the lovely Guatemalan people I met on the trip, and listening to their stories in their own words and language was a profound experience.

The Deacons' Worship Board is encouraging all members and friends of Plymouth to participate in our annual Church World Services Hygiene Kits project.

Deadline for donating completed kits is April 13. Monetary donations are also accepted to cover shipping each kit to its destination at \$2 per kit.

The value for each Hygiene Kit is \$10. Each completed kit contains:

- One hand towel measuring approximately 16" x 28" (no fingertip or bath towels)
- One washcloth
- One wide-tooth comb
- One nail clipper
- One bar of soap (bath size in wrapper)
- One toothbrush (in original packaging)
- Six standard size Band-Aids®

Please place all items in a one-gallon plastic bag with a zipper closure, remove excess air from bag, and seal. Please do not add toothpaste to the Hygiene Kit. Cartons of toothpaste that have an extended expiration date will be added to Hygiene Kit shipments just prior to shipment. Last year, Plymouth completed 167 Hygiene Kits and collected \$850 in donations.
