Licensed Ministry Recognition October 25

This past summer two church members, **Eric Black** and David Grim, initiated the process of becoming Licensed Ministers in Plymouth Church and in the United Church of Christ. In August, Eric and David were interviewed by the Plymouth Church Executive Council, and formally requested the church's support in seeking authorization for Licensed Ministry. The Executive Council was enthusiastic and encouraging in recommending Eric and David for designation as Licensed Ministers.

On Saturday, September 26, I joined with Eric and David as they met with the NE Indiana Association Committee on Ministry, a necessary step in acquiring Licensed Ministry. The Committee on Ministry (COM) follows closely the steps outlined in the UCC Manual on Ministry, a document that offers "Perspectives and Procedures for Ecclesiastical Authorization for Ministry." The COM requires the submission of certain materials - a personal faith journey, verification of Plymouth Church membership, documentation of Plymouth Church endorsement, and letters of recommendation. After yet another interview, which technically served as a "licensing examination," the Committee on Ministry voted to accept Eric and David as Licensed Ministerial Associates serving in Plymouth Church.

There is a history to Licensed Ministry worth noting. The term first appeared when the Constitution and Bylaws of the UCC were amended in the early 1980's. The category for lay minister was replaced with that of Licensed Minister. The current edition of the UCC constitution and bylaws defines a licensed minister as a ...

"... lay minister whom God has called and who has been recognized and authorized by an Association to perform specified duties in a designated Local Church or within that Association...for a designated time...The license may be renewed."

The specified duties mentioned above can include teaching, preaching, and administering church rites and sacraments.

For quite some time Plymouth Church has been graced with the gifts and talents Eric and David have shared with us. I'm thrilled they have responded to the call of God, and have made themselves available to serve in our midst as Licensed Associates. I ask that you encourage them as they work to refine the skills for ministry we know exist.

On **Sunday, October 25, our 10:00 am worship** will include an Order for Affirmation of Licensed Ministry. This will provide us with an opportunity to celebrate with Eric and David, to formally commission and pray for them, and to praise God for their willingness to serve.

Such a service of worship is evidence that God is still speaking, calling forth leaders to strengthen the church. This is very good news that promises to enrich the life we share together.

What: Exploring our Spiritual Gifts – three class sessions

Because this is the season of Stewardship, it seems appropriate to explore the topic of Spiritual Gifts, and how we might use them. We all have occupational skills—things we can do because we use them in our everyday work lives. A homemaker knows how to cook, clean, and manage the family schedule. An accountant is good with numbers and keeping the books. A physician or nurse is a trained healer, and so forth.

Each of us also has natural talents: some have beautiful singing voices, others have athletic abilities, and some can more easily envision and build things. And then there are Spiritual Gifts, which have to do with the call of God, and how we respond to that call. Churches can get in trouble when they confuse these things and collapse them into the work of the church.

Maybe the church member, who already teaches all day, doesn't want to help in the nursery. Maybe the retired minister is happy to be involved in the life of the church, but doesn't want to preach when the pastor is gone. Maybe that trained accountant is more fulfilled by working with the youth of the church than handling the bookkeeping.

This series of adult education classes will be led by Rev. Clare Walter, and explore how we can identify our spiritual gifts, how we can share those gifts for our own personal spiritual growth, and for the welfare and growth of the community...in the church building and outside its walls. From the Stewardship Campaign Chair

Hello Friends.

Let me take this opportunity again to welcome you to the 2015 Stewardship Campaign! This year we are working with the scripture Galatians 6:9-10: "9 So let us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvest time, if we do not give up. 10 So then, whenever we have an opportunity, let us work for the good of all, and especially for those of the family of faith." In my initial letter kicking off the campaign, I asked readers if they could see Plymouth Church in that scripture. Without any work at all I know that I can. Who here grows weary of doing what is right? Who here is not always eager to work for the good of all? Yes, here in Plymouth Church I feel we are constantly seeking out ways to do good and to do good things better!



"Charity begins at home ..." Sir Thomas Browne wrote in 1642. We only have to look to our West next door where we will find "The Cedars." Here is an institution started by Plymouth people for the sole purpose of giving women dealing with mental illness a place to live. Another example of our charity beginning at home is with Study Connection through Fort Wayne Community Schools. We could go on to mention Pride Fest, The Positive Resource Center, Wellspring and Just Neighbors. Our benevolence dollars help to support all of these organizations. It is through your generosity that allows Plymouth Church to "not grow weary in doing what is right."

One of our four "identifiers" is as a "Global Mission Church." Our Benevolence dollars truly have a positive impact in places far away from Fort Wayne, Indiana. On October 18, many from Plymouth were at Salem-Magley UCC to celebrate the harvest that will eventually go to assist people in other parts of the world to become self sufficient in caring for themselves and their families. We are involved in efforts to bring peace to the Middle East through the Indiana Center for Middle East Peace, and with Bright Stars of Bethlehem which promotes outreach efforts of Christmas Lutheran Church in Bethlehem. Other efforts are made through working with the greater UCC to reach even more places in feeding the hungry, providing clothes, and offering hope. Through your generous offerings, we are doing good whenever we have the opportunity.

All of this is only possible through the donation of your time, talent and money. It is a collective effort. Together we do what none of us could do alone. This year, as a congregation, we have been challenged to increase our giving by 5%. Why 5%? Currently the congregation supports about 55% of the overall Operational Budget for the church. Demographic literature from the UCC exists suggesting that a thriving healthy congregation should be supporting at least 60% of the Operational Budget. The Stewardship Committee has established this as a goal for this year's campaign. I believe that we are that thriving healthy congregation and that this goal is within reach. After all, we have a history of exceeding goals given to us. From hygiene kits to diapers to solar panel installation, we exceed goals given to us time and again. I believe that this time will not be different.

Friends, if you are in any way *touched* by the work going on here at Plymouth Church. If you are in anyway *excited* by work going on here at Plymouth Church. If you are in any way *engaged* with the work going on here at Plymouth Church, I ask that you prayerfully consider how much more of your time, talent and money that you can give in order to promote this part of Jesus Christ's mission on Earth.

From The Senior Minister

Friends,

Our October 11th Sunday with the Rev. Patricia Tull, author of, *Inhabiting Eden – Christians, the Bible, and the Ecological Crisis*, was wonderful. She was excellent in her Chapel Class teaching, and in the worship that followed, she stirred us with her preaching. Her work on Mark 10:17-31 ("Prospering in a Perilous World") was an invitation to consider: what "riches" hold us, what "attachments" define us, denying us life in the adventure of following Jesus?

At Plymouth Church, we have most recently declared ourselves to be an "earthwise" congregation. We need be quick to assert this is first and foremost a hope and a prayer. As Tull has written in her book, "The point is not where we are now, but in what direction we are heading ... It is a matter of priorities, a matter of joy, a matter of breaking away from broken systems that use us, into more vivid, vital lives."

To be earthwise is to confess that we have a creation deficit disorder; it is to acknowledge that we need to change our human course and that we intend to do so; it is to recognize that we are inseparably tied to the web of God's creation. Earthwise people pray to pay attention, like Isaiah paid attention: "The whole earth is full of God's glory." (Is. 6:3).

Mary Oliver captures the spirit of being earthwise in her poem, *Praying*. She writes:

It doesn't have to be the blue iris, it could be weeds in a vacant lot, or a few small stones; just pay attention, then Patch a few words together and don't try to make them elaborate, this isn't a contest but the doorway into thanks, and a silence in which another voice may speak.

I like the thought of earthwise being a doorway into thanks. May we all be so blessed. As recipients of such grace may we find ourselves full of wonder, generosity and gratitude.

Annual Friends Of The Third World Sale



Fresh Baked Bread Sale



Thank You from the Associate Pastor

Dear Friends,

Gratitude is my first word to you, to Personnel Board, to my original Covenant of Understanding with Plymouth Church that provided for my two-month sabbatical leave from July 25 to September 24, 2015.

I experienced renewal through the joy of extra time with my family: my daughter and grandchildren here, my sister and her family in Buffalo, NY, my son in New York City. Using genealogy research begun by my late father and continued by my sister, my son and I spent two days at the New York Public Library's Local History and Genealogy department. My great great-grandfather, Andrew Strong and family, had resided in New York from 1847 to 1855. Within original city directories, we discovered three addresses. With my son's knowledge of NYC public transportation and walking routes, we visited two of the addresses, one of which is the original red brick, five-story walk-up apartment building in what is now the West Village. Being of working class ancestry, Andrew's listed occupation of "carman" was described to us as one who worked with horses and wagons. We surmise that city life of that kind may have been too harsh, for the family moved within a year or two to northeast New Jersey where he became a farmer.

My sabbatical reading included three noteworthy books. Each elicited reflection and introspection in different ways:

First: Joan Chittister, Order of St. Benedict, has recently published *Between the Dark and the Daylight, Embracing the Contradictions of Life.* Each of the 32 chapters is a self-contained reflection. Her words are wise and inspiring as she delves into the chaos of concerns in modern life, of the questions that keep us awake at night, fretful and frustrated. Chapters include: "Insecurity of Certainty," "Emptiness of Accumulation," "Poverty of Plenty," "Energy that Comes from Exhaustion," "Productivity of Rest and Recreation," "Creativity of Confusion," "Liberation in Loss," "Loneliness of Love," "Noise within the Silent Self," "Certitude of Doubt," "Invitation of Finality."

Second: Saving Simon, How a Rescue Donkey Taught Me the Meaning of Compassion, by NY Times bestselling author, Jon Katz. You may meet Simon and Jon at **bedlamfarm.com.**




